
David Lee, Utah's Poet Laureate, has published nine books of poetry and/or translations, including *The Porcine Canticles, Drinking and Driving*, and *My Town*, which received the 1995 Western States Book Award and the 1996 Mountain and Plains States Booksellers Award. He has received NEA and NEH fellowships and the Utah Governor's



Award for Lifetime Achievement in the Arts. He has been voted Outstanding Professor of the Year on three occasions at Southern Utah University, where he teaches. He and his family live in Southern Utah.

Carol Lynn Pearson has been a professional writer for thirty years. Her most widely-known book nationally is *Goodbye*, *I Love You*, which was published in 1986 by Random House. It tells the story of her life with her husband, a homosexual man and father of their four children, their divorce and ongoing friendship as she cared for him through his battle with AIDS which finally claimed his life. Christmas book, A Stranger for Christmas sold more than 80,000 copies and is slated as a TV movie in 1997 with CBS. Carol Lynn first made her literary mark as a poet with New Beginnings. She has also written successful nonfiction, musicals, numerous educational motion pictures (one which became a classic and received many international awards. "Cipher

Rick Walton is author of nearly thirty books for children including Noah's Square Dance and Once There Was A Bullfrog. He has published joke books, poetry, activity books and picture books for the national and regional

markets, as well as writing for children's software. His most recent books, You Don't Always Get What You Hope For and Pig, Pigger, and Piggest, are published by Gibbs-Smith. Look soon for Pioneer Dance, a sesquicentennial book published by Deseret Book. Rick lives in Provo.

Carol Lynch Williams has twice won the Utah Arts Council Creative Writing Competition. Kelly and Me, Adeline Street, and the True Colors of Caitlynne Jackson, have all been published by Dell.
